Executive Summary

In March of 2006, Fast Consulting conducted an opinion survey for the Prince Albert Model Forest with a representative sample of 400 residents in the Prince Albert Model Forest area. The primary objectives of the survey were to determine and measure public awareness of the Prince Albert Model Forest, determine Prince Albert Model Forest credibility as a source of forest information, establish the level of support for the direction Prince Albert Model Forest is taking with its various projects, and gather information that will be required to make informed decisions now and in the future.

The Prince Albert Model Forest survey size of 400 residents living within the Model Forest area yields opinion and perception measurements with a statistical level of confidence of 95 percent, within an overall margin of error of plus or minus 4.9%. A system of quality controls enables Fast Consulting to consistently produce reliable and valid results. The margin of error will be larger within the subgroups of the survey population.

Highlights

- Five in ten residents indicate they have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan's natural resources.
- The majority of residents have previously heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest, which is consistent with the 2001 survey results. One-third of those who have heard of the Model Forest read about it in the newspaper.
- The majority of those residents who have heard of the Model Forest recall seeing signs or logos along the highway to Waskesiu, Anglin Lake or Candle Lake that indicate the location of the Prince Albert Model Forest; this is consistent with the 2001 survey results.
- One in ten residents who have heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest are aware of projects that are currently underway; this is slightly lower than the 2001 survey results. Also, more residents are able to name those projects than the residents from the 2001 survey.
- The large majority of residents support the direction the Prince Albert Model Forest is taking with its goals; a slight increase since the 2001 survey results.
- More than two-thirds of residents think the Prince Albert Model Forest partnership is a credible source of information about forest issues; this has increased by 2% since 2001.
- The majority of residents indicate they currently use the media and friends as sources of forest-related information.
- More than one-half of residents think the Prince Albert Model Forest is doing a good job in working toward sustainable forest management; this is 4% lower than the 2001 survey results.

Objectives & Methodology

Fast Consulting was retained by the Prince Albert Model Forest to conduct an opinion survey with a representative sample of Prince Albert Model Forest area residents. The objectives of the research include:

- ✓ determining and measuring public awareness of the Prince Albert Model Forest;
- ✓ determining Prince Albert Model Forest credibility as a source of forest information;
- ✓ establishing the level of support for the direction Prince Albert Model Forest is taking with its various projects; and
- ✓ gathering information that will be required to make informed decisions now and in the future.

The questionnaire was designed in consultation with Fast Consulting and the Prince Albert Model Forest. Fast Consulting assembled the survey into an interview format. It was pre-tested to ensure that all of the questions asked were understood and the information being gathered addressed the research objectives. The sample frame for this survey was constructed to obtain complete interviews from a representative cross section of 400 residents in communities within and around Prince Albert Model Forest, including Candle Lake, La Ronge, Montreal Lake, Prince Albert and Waskesiu.

Interview respondents were selected randomly from telephone number lists provided by ASDE Survey Sampler out of Hull, Quebec, using a random digit dialing methodology, a standard polling practice to ensure random selection of households and respondents. Random selection is designed to allow for equal probability of anyone over the age of 18 being selected for participation in the survey. The electronic sample frame will also be constructed to ensure proportionate representation of important demographic characteristics evident within the region such as gender and age.

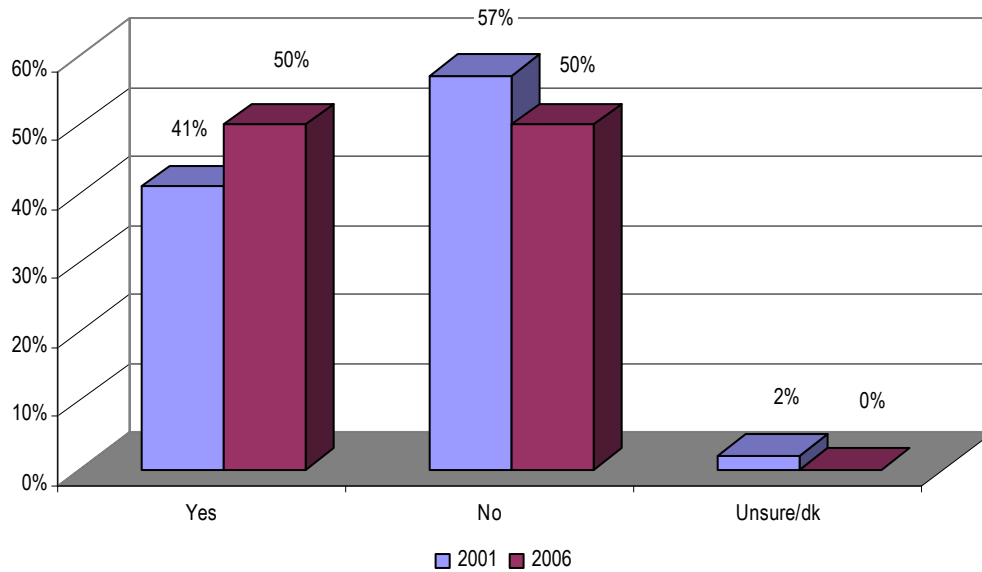
Four hundred residents in the Prince Albert Model Forest area were interviewed between March 15th and March 26th, 2006 for this survey. Interviews were conducted by telephone at times that were appropriate and convenient for respondents – generally weekdays between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. and weekends between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. All interviews were conducted by Fast Consulting's in-house public opinion interviewers using our *Computer Aided Telephone Interviewing* (CATI) call centre.

The Prince Albert Model Forest survey sample size of 400 people yields public opinion measurements with a statistical level of confidence of 95 percent, within an overall margin of error of plus or minus 4.9 percentage points. Frequency charts for all public opinion issues are illustrated in this report.

Fast Consulting designed and implemented programs to facilitate the statistical analysis using the industry standard SPSS computer program (Statistical Package for Social Sciences). Data checking procedures were utilized at all times to ensure accuracy of the data. Statistical tests were also conducted on the demographics to ensure reliability and validity of the survey data.

1 Natural Resources

Question. Do you have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan's natural resources?



- Approximately one-half (50%) of residents indicate they have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan's natural resources; this is a 9% increase from 2001 (41%).
- Residents living outside Prince Albert (55%) are more likely than Prince Albert residents (47%) to have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan's natural resources.

Question. What is the nature of your interest or involvement in Saskatchewan's natural resources?

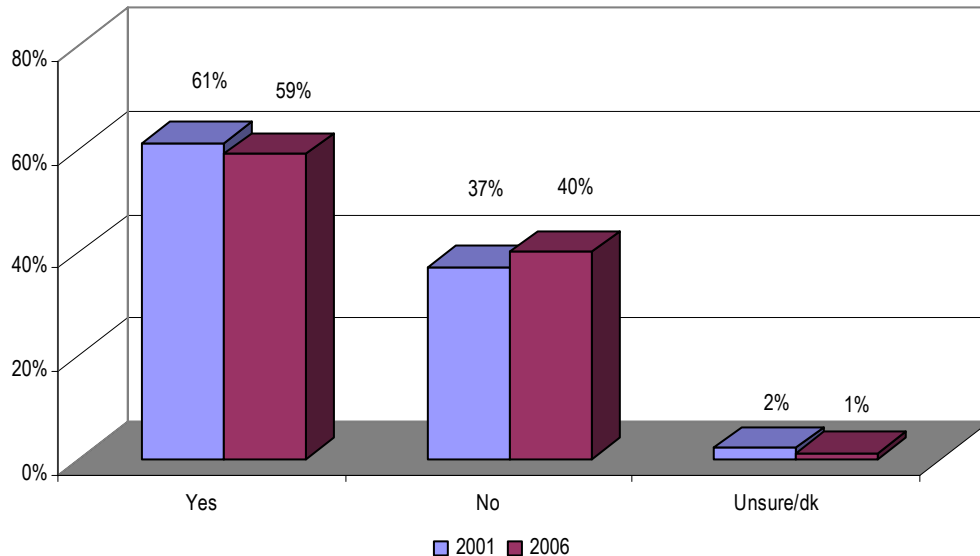

- More than one-half (62%) of those residents who have an interest or involvement in Saskatchewan's natural resources indicate they are concerned residents (31% of all respondents) - this is substantially higher than the 2001 survey results (39% or 17% of all respondents).
- Approximately, 20% work in the industry or a family works in the industry (10% of all respondents) and 8% are interested or involved in recreation (4% of all respondents).
- None of the respondents in 2006 show interest or involvement in Saskatchewan's natural resources for the reason that they are properly managed resources, while 19% of respondents did in 2001.

2 Awareness of the Prince Albert Model Forest

Awareness

Question. Have you previously heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest?



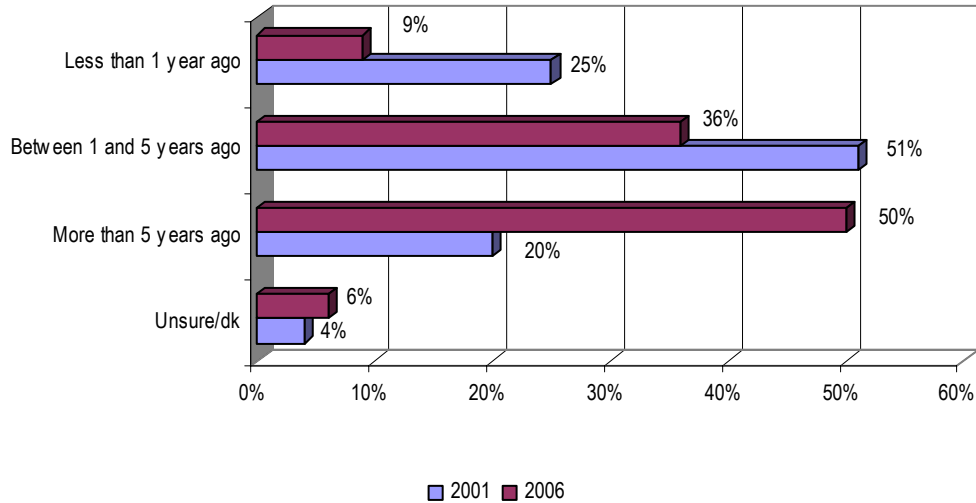
- The majority (59%) of residents have previously heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest.
- Awareness of the Prince Albert Model Forest is consistent with the survey conducted in 2001 where 61% of respondents indicate having heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest.
- Males (64%) are more likely than females (55%) to have heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest.
- Residents who earn at least half of their annual income from forest-based activities (65%) are more likely than those without forest based income (59%) to be aware of the Prince Albert Model Forest.
- Residents who indicate they have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan's natural resources (70%) are more likely than those who have no interest in the management of natural resources (49%) to be aware of the Prince Albert Model Forest.

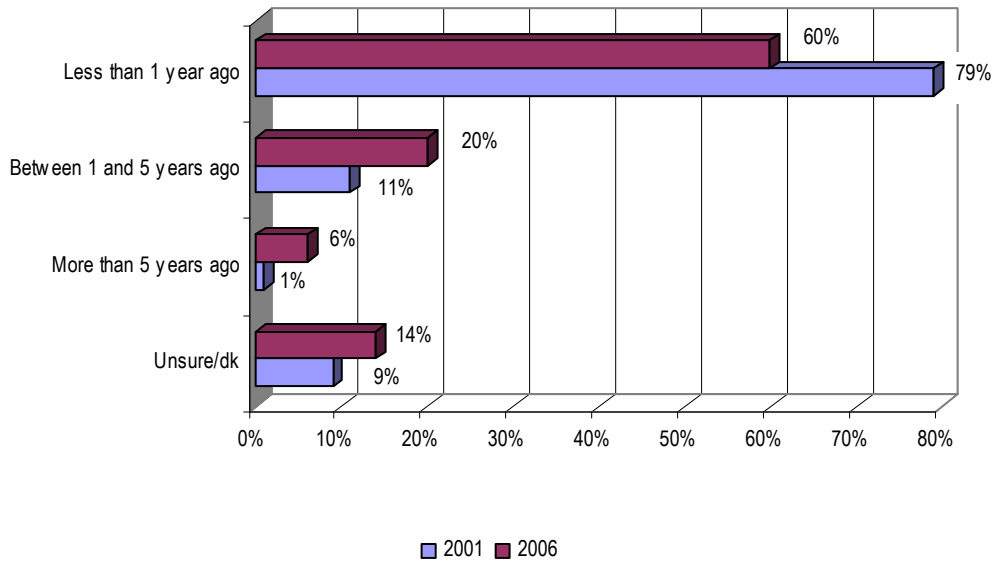
- Of those residents who have previously heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest, approximately one-third (33%) have heard of the organization in newspapers (20% of all respondents), and 24% say television (14% of all respondents) – this has increased by 4% and 6%, respectively, from the 2001 survey results.
- Approximately, 18% indicate radio (11% of all respondents) and 11% have heard of the organization through word of mouth (6% of all respondents).
- Awareness of the Prince Albert Model Forest through word of mouth has decreased by 6% since 2001.
- Awareness of the Prince Albert Model Forest through school has increased by 5% since 2001.

Question. When would you say you first heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest?



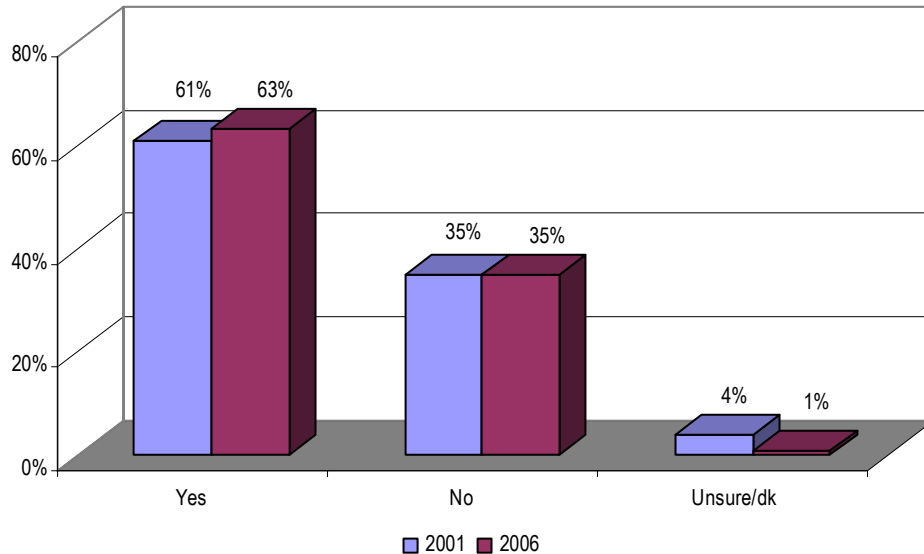
- The majority (50%) of those residents who have previously heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest first heard of the organization more than five years ago (30% of all respondents).
- In 2001, one-quarter (25%) of residents had first heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest less than 1 year ago, while only 9% of residents, in 2006, first heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest less than one year ago.

Question. When did you most recently hear about the Model Forest?



- Less than two-thirds (60%) of those who have previously heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest indicate they most recently heard about the Prince Albert Model Forest within the past year (35% of all respondents).
- In 2001, more than three-quarters (79%) of those who have previously heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest indicate they most recently heard about the Model Forest within the past year (48% of all respondents).

Question. Do you recall seeing any signs or logos along the highway to Waskesiu, Anglin Lake or Candle Lake that indicate the location of the Prince Albert Model Forest?

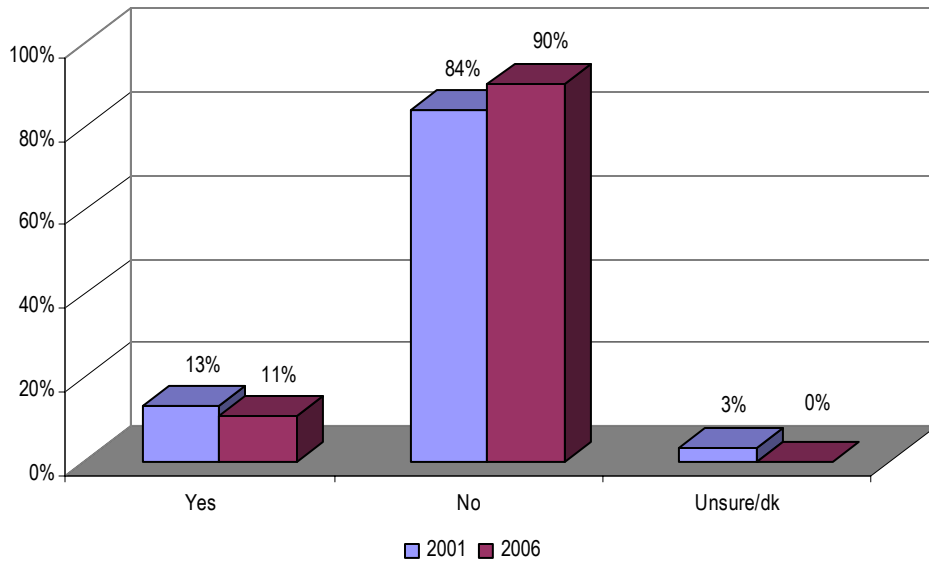


- The majority (63%) of those residents who have heard of the Model Forest recall seeing signs or logos along the highway to Waskesiu, Anglin Lake or Candle Lake that indicate the location of the Prince Albert Model Forest (38% of all respondents); this is consistent with the 2001 results (61%).
- Residents between the ages of 18 and 24 (29%) are less likely than older residents to recall seeing signs or logos along the highway.
- Residents who earn at least half of their annual income from forest-based activities (67%) are more likely than those without forest-based income (63%) to recall seeing signs or logos along the highway.
- Residents who indicate they have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan's natural resources (69%) are more likely than those who have no interest in the management of natural resources (56%) to recall seeing signs or logos along the highway.
- Residents living outside Prince Albert (75%) are more likely than Prince Albert residents (59%) to recall seeing signs or logos along the highway.

Awareness of projects

Unaided

Question. Are you aware of any Prince Albert Model Forest projects that are currently underway?



- Approximately, 11% of those residents who have heard of the Prince Albert Model Forest are aware of the projects that are currently underway (6% of all respondents), slightly less than the 2001 survey results (13%).
- Residents who indicate they have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan's natural resources (15%) are more likely than those who have no interest in the management of natural resources (5%) to be aware of any Model Forest projects that are currently underway.

- In 2001, 78% of those residents who were aware of the Prince Albert Model Forest projects underway were unable to name any of these projects; however, in 2006 only 36% of those residents are unable to name any of the projects.
- Approximately, 15% of those residents aware of Prince Albert Model Forest projects currently underway, identify research sites/field tours and 12% identify Cumberland Delta moose management project.

Aided

Question. Do you recall hearing, reading or seeing information about the following projects conducted by the Prince Albert Model Forest:

- Slightly less than one-half (42%) of residents recall information about helping fire communities become FireSmart, 35% recall hearing about Woodland Caribou research, 32% recall information about Climate change research and 23% recall hearing about the Aschim Homestead Heritage Forest near Candle Lake.
- Residents who indicate they have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan’s natural resources or earn at least half of their annual income from forest-based activities are more likely than those residents with no interest or involvement in natural resource management or income from forest-based activities to recall information about each of these projects.
- Prince Albert residents (27%) are less likely than residents living outside Prince Albert (32%) to recall information about each of these projects.
- More specifically, residents living outside Prince Albert (26%) are more likely than Prince Albert residents (13%) to recall information about the Wapus Lake Elk Re-establishment project.
- Males (33%) are more likely than females (25%) to recall information about each of these projects.

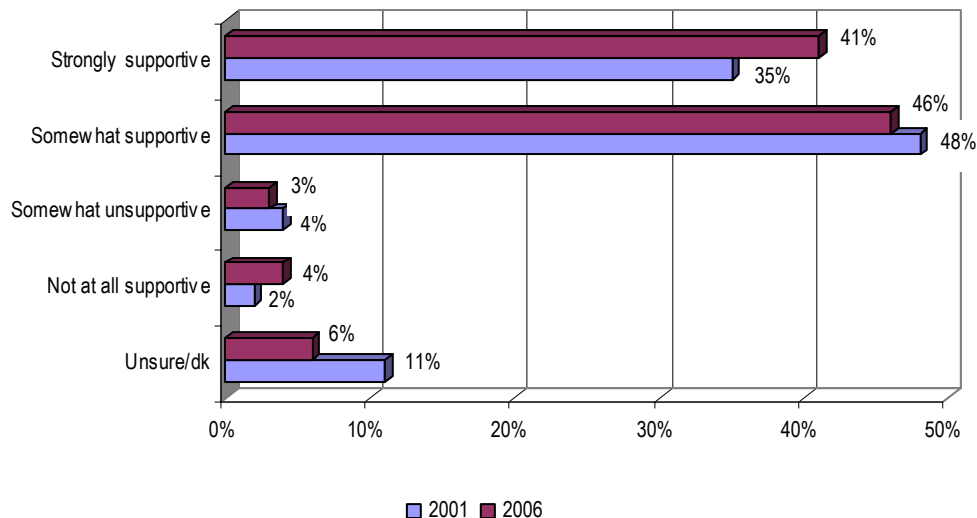
3 Support for the Prince Albert Model Forest

Goals

The Prince Albert Model Forest has established three goals:

- 1) the first is sustainable forest management: to ensure the forests and their ecological, social and economic benefits are here forever;
- 2) the second is development and dissemination of information for community capacity, and
- 3) the third is scientific and technological advancement to reduce environmental impact.

Question. Which best describes your level of support of the direction the Prince Albert Model Forest is taking with its goals? Would you say that you are strongly supportive, somewhat supportive, somewhat unsupportive, or not supportive at all of the direction the Prince Albert Model Forest is taking?



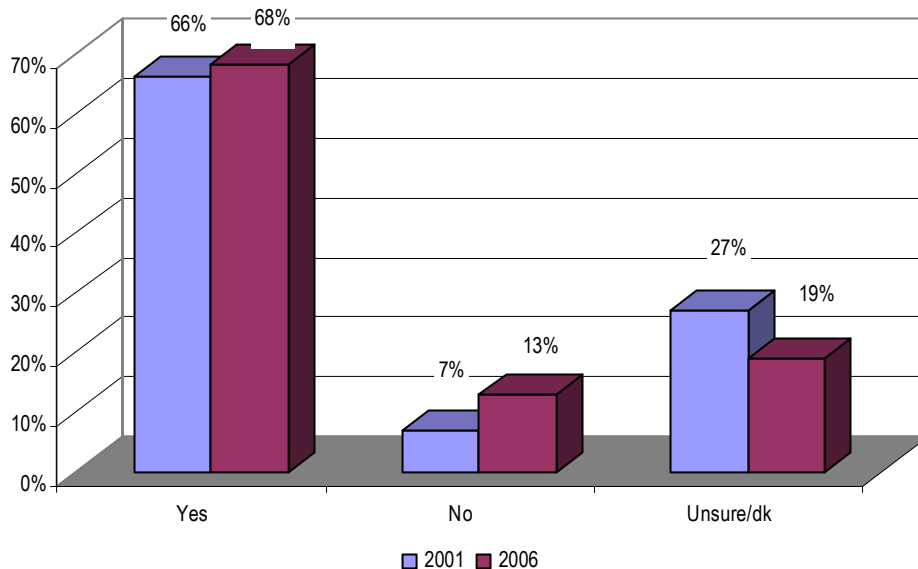
- The large majority (87%) of residents support the direction the Prince Albert Model Forest is taking with its goals; this has increased slightly since 2001 (83%).
- Residents who indicate they have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan’s natural resources (46%) are more likely than those who have no interest in the management of natural resources (37%) to strongly support the direction the Prince Albert Model Forest is taking with its goals.

Question. Do you feel the Prince Albert Model Forest partnership is a credible source of information about forest issues?



- More than two-thirds (68%) of residents think the Prince Albert Model Forest partnership is a credible source of information about forest issues; this has increased by 2% since 2001.
- Approximately, 13% of residents do not think the Prince Albert Model Forest partnership is a credible source of information about forest issues; this has increased by 6% since 2001.
- Residents who indicate they have an interest or involvement in the management of Saskatchewan's natural resources (70%) are more likely than those who have no interest in the management of natural resources (67%) to think the Prince Albert Model Forest partnership is a credible source of information about forest issues.
- Residents who earn at least half of their annual income from forest-based activities (73%) are more likely than those without forest-based income (68%) to think the Prince Albert Model Forest partnership is a credible source of information about forest issues.
- Males (69%) and females (67%) are as equally likely to think the Prince Albert Model Forest partnership is a credible source of information about forest issues.
- Residents between the ages of 25 and 34 (82%) are more likely than older residents and residents between the ages of 18 and 24 (75%) to think the Prince Albert Model Forest partnership are a credible source of information about forest issues.

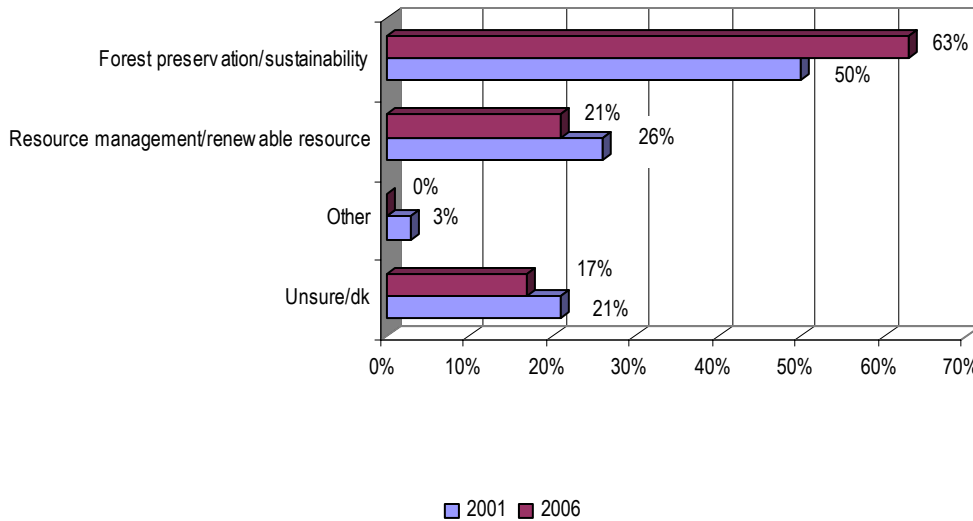

Please Note: The 'other' category includes: books/literature, Wildlife federation, word of mouth, work, school, local agencies, radio, and television.

- The majority of residents indicate they currently use the media (73%) and their friends (59%) as sources of forest-related information; this is consistent with the top two sources of information from the 2001 survey (media 73% and friends 59%).
- Slightly less than one-half (44%) of residents use forest industry professionals, forest industry companies (43%), Internet (43%), Saskatchewan Environment and Resource Management (SERM) (42%).
- More than one-third of residents use trade shows/expos (37%), libraries (35%), and environmental organizations (34%) as sources of forest-related information.
- Residents are more likely to use the Internet (43%) in 2006 as a source for any forest-related information compared to 2001 (29%).
- Residents are less likely to use trade shows/expos in 2006 as a sources for any forest-related information compared to 2001 (46%).

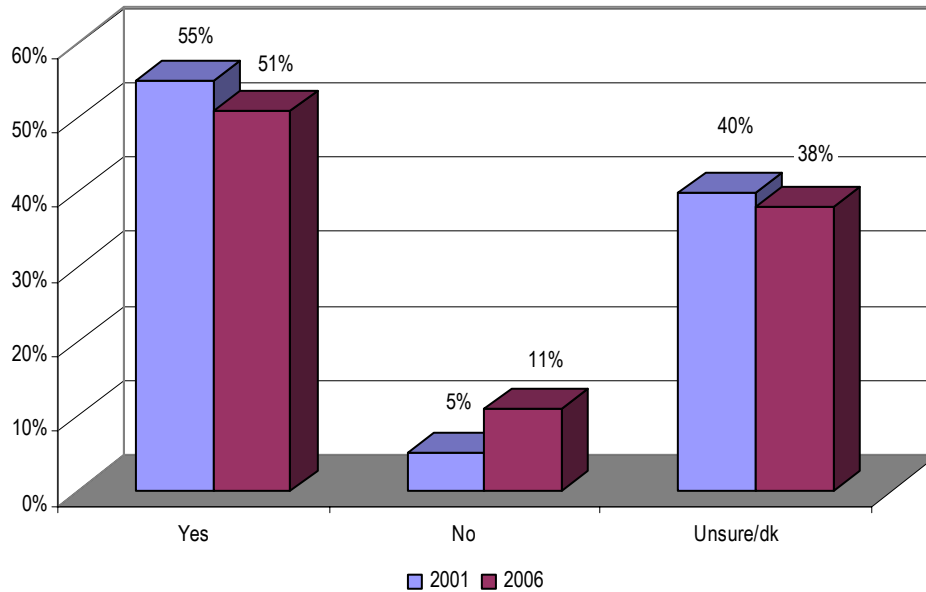
Sustainable Forest Management

Question. What does the phrase “Sustainable Forest Management” mean to you?



- For more than one-half (63%) of residents the phrase “Sustainable Forest Management” means forest preservation and sustainability; this is a 13% increase from the 2001 survey results.
- For approximately 21% the phrase means managing forest resources/renewable resource; this is slightly lower than the 2001 survey results (26%).

Question. Do you think that the Prince Albert Model Forest is working successfully toward sustainable forest management? That is, do you think they are doing a good job?



- More than one-half (51%) of residents think the Prince Albert Model Forest is doing a good job in working toward sustainable forest management; this is 4% lower than the 2001 survey results.
- Approximately, 11% of residents think the Prince Albert Model Forest is not doing a good job in working toward sustainable forest management; this is 6% higher than the 2001 survey results.
- Prince Albert residents (53%) are more likely than residents living outside Prince Albert (45%) to think the Prince Albert Model Forest is doing a good job in working toward sustainable forest management.
- Residents between the ages of 18 and 24 (66%) are more likely than older residents to think the Prince Albert Model Forest is doing a good job in working toward sustainable forest management.

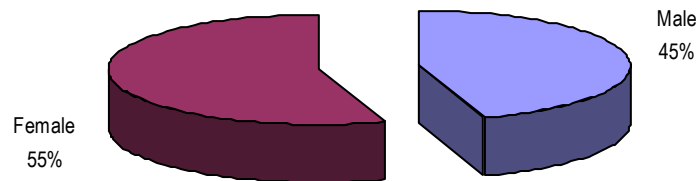

Survey Demographics

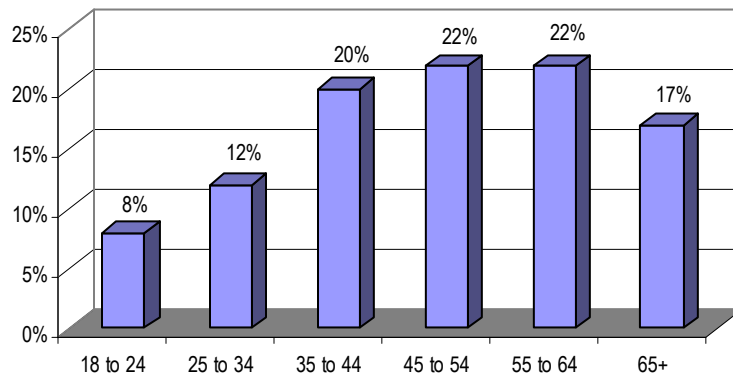
The Prince Albert Model Forest public opinion survey sample frame is constructed to facilitate proportionate representation of various demographic characteristics evident within the Prince Albert Model Forest area population. This ensures the opinions of all the various types of residents in the area are proportionately represented in the statistical measurements documented in this report. The demographic distributions from the survey sample generally parallel the actual distributions, as measured by Statistics Canada census data.

The Prince Albert Model Forest survey sample size of 400 people yields public opinion measurements with a statistical level of confidence of 95 percent within an overall margin of error for point estimates contained in this report of plus or minus 4.9 percentage points.

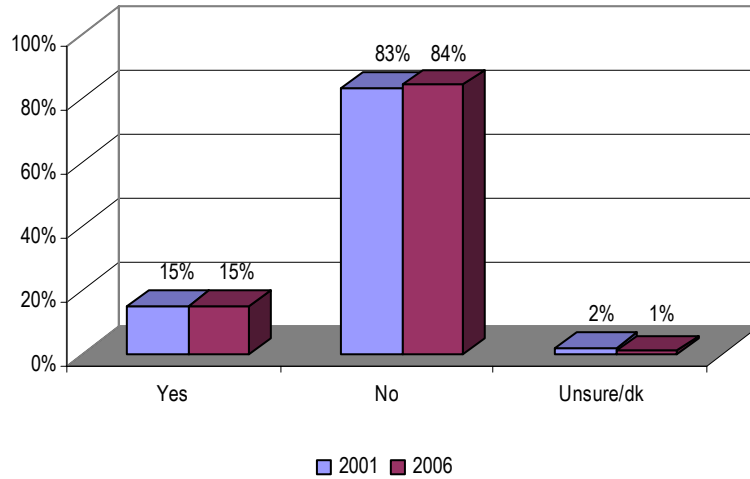
Survey sample gender distribution



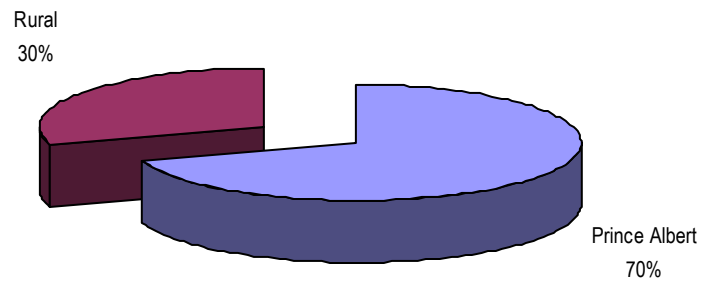
Survey sample age distribution
